



Band of the Month

en At Work have dramatically joined the ranks of Little River Band, Air Supply and AC/DC in the 'upper stratosphere' of Australian bands who have stormed the American charts. With Who Can It Be Now? a number one hit, and Downunder looming up strongly behind it, the lovable Melbourne pub band have realised their wildest dreams.

Colin Hay (vocals/guitar), Greg Ham (vocals/reeds/keyboards/percussion), Jerry Speiser (drums), Ron Strykert (guitar) and John Rees (bass) are undoubtedly the Oz outfit of 1982 in the eyes of the Men At Work assembled during 1979 in the inner Melbourne suburb of Richmond and made their home at the Cricketer's Arms Hotel, a good Aussie pub if ever there was one. To satisfy a loyal following, they recorded their most popular stage song, *Downunder*, and pressed up 500 copies on their own independent label. Today those little bits of plastic are worth a fortune. The song hardly created a murmur of interest at the

time though.
Through the ceaseless ef-

forts of a loyal fan, who also happened to be an employee of CBS Records, the Men were signed to a proper recording deal in 1980. But not before the record company carpark had been barricaded with giant 'Men At Work' road signs. The deal came just as frustration was beginning to set in. "We really needed it then" says Colin, "because we were getting a bit tired of just going around the pubs, it was getting a bit mechanical".

Nobody, not the band, nor CBS, nor the fans, could have predicted the damburst which accompanied the May 1981 release of Who Can It Be Now?

It was national number 2 for 5 weeks, followed in November by Downunder, which was national number 1 for 6 weeks (and number 1 in New Zealand). Both were gold singles, while the Business As Usual album soared past triple platinum, after holding down the national number 1 positon for 9 weeks. One reviewer noted at the time, "Men At Work have come up with the novel idea of putting ten hits on their first album . . . if you have to crawl a mile over broken bottles to get a copy, don't hesitate". Before the massive 'break-

out' occurred, the blonde and devastating Greg Ham made a living teaching woodwinds to 9-16 year olds. He has fond memories of this period and admits that he is now a bit of a superstar at the school where he taught. "The idea of a teacher becoming a rock star is an inconceivable Cinderella story for most kids" he claims. "I rarely get asked for an autograph when I visit the school because all my old students have a half a dozen notes from me to their parents abusing them for not practising . . . and they're all signed!"

After a couple of weeks of trying, Countdown Club Magazine editor Glenn A. Baker tracked down Men At Work in a hotel room in Minneapolis, Minnesota, in the American midwest. Before they snatched some well deserved sleep, Greg and Colin shared some of their thoughts with Countdown Club members



INTERVIEW WITH GREG HAM CDC: How are you finding American audiences Greg?

GH: They're not so different to the people we play to in Australia, except that a lot of them are more familiar with Who Can It Be Now? than Men At Work. But they're very enthusiastic. The musical climate here at the moment is just perfect for us, our timing is great. The American public is looking for something new and fresh and there is a huge interest in Australia. Like, the koala on the Qantas TV ad here is a cult symbol — there are marsupial groupies!

CDC: Is it an advantage for the band to be supporting a Fleetwood Mac Tour? GH: Oh, absolutely, we are getting some incredible exposure all over America just when people want to see us. The Macs, it turns out, were into the band long before we broke in America. They have an Australian security guy who brought our album over after Christmas and turned them onto it. They booked us for the tour well before we had an American hit. It's great working with them, they're all really nice people.

CDC: Are you enjoying being in America at the moment, is it an exciting experience?

GH: Sometimes when I step out of the front door of our hotel in Hollywood, onto Sunset Strip, I feel like I'm not even on the same planet as Australia! Actually, I spend a

CDC: Do you think that your overseas success will increase or decrease your Australian popularity in any way?

GH: We've already found our audience at home and I don't think people are going to say, "Well they've made it in the States, they must be ok, I'll go out and buy their record". Australians don't think like that anymore.

band where the backlog runs out and you have to think 'What am I going to do now?'. When you're young, resilient and ready to take on the world, you write furiously and plan away. But when you're actually making records and touring, that takes up most of your energy. The key is to really keep things balanced so that you still have the time to write songs, rehearse, and just spend time together.

CDC: Some American critics are comparing Men At Work to Police. Does that upset you? CH: Not at all. I've been sing-

CH: Not at all. I've been singing the way I've been singing for a long time. It just so happens there are similarities between my voice and Sting's.

Both bands chorus guitars, use open chording, and get a sparse sound, that's just the way it goes. They just happened to get up there before we did. In reviews, critics say we sound like this or like that but I've never even heard half the people we're compared to. CDC: You guys have been tagged as 'leftover hipples' in Australia. Is that accurate?

CH: I've never been a hippie but I came through that period. For me, the good thing about it was that people came out of it with a strong direction. The stereotype of the hippie was of this passive person, but that was just the surface. What was really happening was some active and politically heavy things. It was a very strong period and you couldn't help but be influenced by it. Most of us took a stab at college education. I went to university because it was easy. It legitimised my existence. All around me people were being put in jail and physically beaten. All that had an effect.

CDC: Are Men At Work paving the way for other Australian bands in America?

CH: As far as we're concerned, we're paving the way for us. That's about it. If there are other bands who can cut it, good luck to them. Our allegiance is to Men At Work, first and foremost. If other bands have their act together they can do the same thing. I hope they do.

CDC: Being on the road a lot doesn't seem to bother you that much.

CH: It's pretty good because there's always a laugh to be gained and everyone in the band likes to laugh a lot. It'd be pretty terrible if you had some glum, moody person to whom life was a constant burden or who thought that the problems of the world were on his shoulders. Everyone's fairly level here. We've been doing it for more than three years now and nobody hates anybody else yet. But it's good to get home and wash the dishes, do the laundry and just try to think about what you're going to do with the day.

CDC: Best of luck with the tour guys. All your Australian fans are proud of you and are looking forward to having you return home.

CH: Thanks a lot, we really appreciate all the support. We are doing our best over here.

CDC: Are all your shows with Fleetwood Mac?

GH: No, we've been headlining some of our own shows, at places like Buffalo, Chicago, Huntington Beach and the Peppermint Lounge in New York. With the Macs we've covered an awful lot of miles, most of them in one of those legendary American tour coaches, with videos, bars, beds, lounges and all that stuff. They give us all the lights and sound that we need, none of that short-changing the opening act stuff.

After the American dates we go to Canada to do some dates

lot of my time watching television in my hotel room, particularly 'Wild Wild West'. As you can see, I'm easily pleased!

CDC: Is the relative anyonymity you find outside of Australia a bit of a relief for you?

GH: Yea I guess so. I was able to go to a King Crimson concert last week without a lot of people coming up and asking me questions. Back home it was getting a bit difficult to hop on a tram or a train without people looking at us, wondering where our limo was. Sometimes cars would stop beside us at traffic lights and people would yell out things like, "How'd the last tour go?" CDC: I suppose that most American interviewers are asking you the meaning of Who Can It Be Now?. Have you worked

out an answer yet? GH: When Colin wrote it he was living in a low-rent district of Melbourne and, in those circumstances, when you are not expecting a friend to drop around, anyone who knocks on the door you figure is someone you don't want to see. It's a mild form of paranoia that everyone experiences at some stage. At the time, Colin was on the dole and Social Security inspectors had a habit of coming around at odd times to make sure he was out looking

INTERVIEW WITH COLIN HAY CDC: Has the demands of success on such a massive scale altered the character of the hand?

CH: Now there's lots of young, bright-eyed, clear-skinned 16 year old girls down the front at gigs who love the songs and know every word. So now I have to learn all the words properly and sing them exactly right because they really pick up on that and tell me if I get it wrong. I used to blunder my way through and miss verses and everything but I can't do that now. That's the hardest

CDC: Do you miss playing at the Cricketer's Arms Hotel in Richmond?

CH: I think that probably the Cricketer's Arms is the closest you could get to the centre of the Universe! No, when you think about it, we still play gigs. All that changes is the fact that we know the shows are going to be sold out, which is a good feeling that lets you take care of playing and forget worrying.

CDC: You've finished recording the *Cargo* album. Are there any plans yet for a third LP?

CH: The third album will be the ONE. We've been using up a backlog of tunes so far but there comes a time with any







Bolanmania Revisited struck Australia in 1982. A 20 track 'best of' was a top five platinum charter, and when Melbourne's 2MMM-FM recently broad-cast a three hour documentary on his life, it received the strongest response to a program since the station began operation.

Marc's music, be it in his acoustic folk or electric rock periods, was steeped in images of harlequins, fawns, eagles, golden cats, Persian beggars, woodland nymphs, elves, goblins and mythological references. At his peak he became an international figure far beyond simple rock'n'roll stardom. He was seen as the Satyr and Mystic that he often claimed to be - a charismatic being who captured the fascination of the world.

ON THE BRINK:

t seems a bit odd that a band with five internationally successful albums to their credit should be showcased in 'On The Brink'. But for Japan, Australia is a final frontier for conquest. For reasons strange and unfathomable, this country has managed to resist the charm of this stylish, talented outfit.

Japan comprises lead Singer David Sylvian (also synthesizers), drummer Steve Jansen, bassist Mick Karn and Richard Barbien on keyboards. They have been together, with minor variations in line-up, since 1978 and are now being recognised as the forerunners of the New Romantic movement which spawned the likes of Spandau Ballet, Visage, Haircut 100, Altered Images, Classix Nouveaux, Echo & The Bunnymen and Theatre of Hate. In England, David is a high-profile teen-idol figure on par with Steve Strange, Adam Ant, Nick Heyward, Simon Le Bon, Phil Oakey, Sting and Midge Ure.

The most succinct description of the group comes from Dave Gelley a critic for the Observer newspaper in London. He says, There is a steely certainty about Japan which freezes the libes of the fashionable world and insists upon attention. 'Ignore us if you like' the stares seem to say, 'but you will be missing something'. It has taken a long time, partly because the band's music is totally bafflingly at odds with the visual image and partly because it reveals its extraordinary qualities only after repeated hearings. It is serious music, not solemn or self-important, but serious in the sense that rigour and craftsmanship and commitment have gone into its creation. It doesn't sound like anyone else; it is unique; it is Japan's music."

True to it's name, Japan's music reflects the oriental atmosphere which the band finds so alluring. During a recent tour of the Far East, the influences, observations and atmosphere absorbed served to strengthen a strong stylistic thread that has been evident since the first album, Adolescent Sex. The most recent LP, Tin Drum, is highlighted by the tracks Visions Of China and Cantonese Boy. Ironically, when Japan did fin-ally crash into the UK top twenty, it was with Quiet Life, a two year old track featuring depart-



ed guitarist Rob Dean. Far from being 'over made-up pretty boys', as certain pockets of the British rock press have labelled them, Japan represent a truly original dimension in eighties rock. Attitude is an allimportant factor - an attitude that leads them to plough their own course and create their own music, treating detractors with the contempt they deserve. Focus upon the group invariably centres upon dazzling leader David Sylvian, whose lyrics, vocals and synthesizer work galvanise attention. David is an eccentric figure who shuns much of the social whirl that

only mix with a few people" he admits. "I prefer to stay indoors. If I go to a nightclub I find the quietest place to be, where I'm least likely to be approached by other people. I feel so vulnerable when I'm surrounded by strange people in a public place. Maybe it's because of things that happened when I was younger - being beaten up.

David's stubborness and Japan's talent will inevitably result in their complete international breakthrough. Sample a taste yourself . . . but prepare to be converted. Currently on the market, on the Virgin label, is the Gentlemen Take Polaroids and Tin Drum albums, while the best of their first three LPs has been captured on the RCA Assemblage album.

GLENN SHORROCK Villian of the Peace (Capitol)

It has taken Glenn Shorrock more than twenty years of distinguished rock'n'roll service to arrive at a complete understanding and mastery of his own immense talents. This magnificent album is a testament to his skills as a singer, songwriter and performer. It is infinitely more human, honest and revealing than any Little River Band

Recorded in Los Angeles with such legendary musicians as Bill Payne, Garth Hudson, Skunk Baxter, Andrew Gold, Jimmy

Fadden, Tom Scott and David Lindley, as well as three former Eagles, Villian of the Peace is a mature, perceptive and often witty statement. The title track tells, with brutal honesty, the real story behind the split of LRB, while Will You Stand With Me (easily the best cut) and the single Rock'n'Roll Soldier tell the story of Glenn Shorrock, the artist. He should have done this years ago.

VERDICT: *****

Shabooh Shoobah (WEA)

It doesn't take a crystal ball to realise that the highly talented INXS cannot be contained within this country for very much longer. This, their third album, is absolutely world class. The texture of the instruments (particularly the interplay between guitar and keyboards), the intelligent structure of the songs. Mark Opitz' shimmering production, and even the packaging reeks of style and imagination. This can be placed alongside albums by ABC, Flock of Seagulls, Duran Duran and Ultravox in terms of overall quality in the new music area. Wisely, the hit single, The One Thing, vocalised superbly by Michael Hutchence, opens the album. It's fine sailing from there.

WENDY & THE ROCKETS Live (Mushroom)

It's great to finally have Wendy Stapleton on an album, even if it does have only six tracks. Recorded live at the Lower Plenty and Dorset Gardens hotels in Melbourne back in June, these cuts represent the crisp energy that has elevated the band to a top drawcard position in their

home city. Like Sharon O'Neill, Wendy is a quality songwriter and was responsible for all but one of the tracks on this mini-LP. Neatly arranged and well balanced, they are highlighted by some tasty guitar from Joey Amenta (formerly with Taste) Best cut is Burn Like Fire, although When I'm Gone rocks hard enough to give Cheetah a run for their money. Now let's hope that like Lisa Bade, Wendy is allowed the luxury of a bigbudget studio album

BILLY IDOL Billy Idol (Chrysalis)

Generation X. After laying low for a couple of years he has been floated back on the market by new manager Bill Aucoin, who also handles Kiss and Shangai. His first solo album has been ably produced by Kieth Forsey, currently skirting the charts himself with Take Me To The Pilot. It is a straight-ahead rock LP, somewhat at odds with his original sound and image. Thunderous backing, energetic vocals and tensile songs add up to an enjoyable new album that should provide a solid springboard for a solo career in the 80's for Mr Idol, despite his presumptuous name.

VERDICT: ***½

JOHN WAITE Ignition (Chrysalis)

The powerful lead voice from The Babys (remember Isn't It Time?) makes a welcome reappearance on this dynamic album. Ignition is a fitting title, because this album sparks from the opening cut - White Heat. Waite's music is a degree more powerful and contemporary than most coming out of dull of America at the moment. The mix by engineer Bob Clearmountain, who co-produces the Church, would sound great on a \$10 stereo. Waite's high-register voice soars over one pounding thumper after another and it's hard to keep your feet still. Put this on at a party and watch the place erupt.





Rick and Darryl are still enjoying strong solo recording careers. Beeb is a founder member of the Little River Band, and Rick was drummer with the 1977 number one hit group the Ferrets. By the way, Beeb's real name is Gerard Bertlekamp



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
